## A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JENN

#### Dear Friends,

One of my favorite Christmas stories is Dr. Seuss' "How the Grinch Stole Christmas!". Many people think that the point of the story is the Grinch's revelation that Christmas isn't about presents. The Grinch tries to stop Christmas from coming by stealing all of the food, decorations, and gifts, but when the Whos wake up to find that everything they have is gone, they're still able to hold hands with their neighbors and welcome Christmas in song. "Maybe Christmas" the Grinch thought, "doesn't come from a store. Maybe Christmas ... perhaps ... means a little bit more!"

The true insight of this story is revealed in the last panel of the book when the Grinch is seated at the place of honor among the Whos' feast, and a wreath appears like a halo behind his head. Something holy has happened. Something beautiful has taken place, and how perfect it is that former enemies are now seated around the same table sharing a meal.

From Dr. Seuss' perspective, the meaning of Christmas is the joy of reconciliation. The Whos' Christmas song of joy stirs an echo in the Grinch's heart and he experiences the revelation that God is with him. His response to that revelation is an offer of peace. Because the Whos know the true meaning of Christmas, they are able to forgive the Grinch. Former enemies feast together and celebrate the joy of Christmas.

Joy is the steadfast assurance that God is with us ... Emmanuel. God is with us yesterday, today, and tomorrow; and because of that knowledge, we are able to join hands with our neighbors and raise our voices in song, even in the midst of pain and suffering.

Last month we lit a candle of the Advent Wreath each Sunday at the beginning of worship. Advent is a season of preparation, and a time to remind us of the nature of God's presence with us. We lit the candle of Love as an expression of the past, reminding us of what God has done for us in the person of Jesus Christ. The candle of Peace is our work in the present: putting down our swords and differences, and working toward reconciliation. The candle of Hope projects us into the future when ultimately there will be a new heaven and a new earth. And the fourth candle – the candle of Joy – is a timeless reminder that brings all three together at once. Love, peace, and hope – the past, present, and future – all proclaiming that the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are with us always in joy.

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I Am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20) Blessings,



As we begin the new year, we thank all who served on the Board of Trustees, especially Bill Arlequeeuw, who served for many years and will continue to serve in a consulting and advisory capacity, as well as performing feats of carpentry and physical work.

The trustees were very busy in 2024. They have been able to complete several projects and are always working to improve and maintain both the Church and Parsonage.

Our biggest accomplishment this year was the installation of the handicap ramp and the modifications made to one of the bathrooms in the Education Wing. This included new plumbing, fixtures, doorways and flooring. The project was supported by a grant provided by Human Resource Development

In order to ensure safety in the play area and parking lot, four diseased trees were taken down and removed.

In the Education Wing, the exterior steps were painted and batteries replaced in 5 Emergency lights, overhead lighting was updated to LED lighting and the door of the Conference Room was enlarged to become ADA compliant.

A stained glass window in the Sanctuary was repaired.

In the Fellowship Hall Kitchen, the ceiling and light fixtures were replaced. The latest project, just getting started is the additional upgrade to the kitchen, to included new flooring, sink and stainless steel work tables. All kitchen upgrades were paid for by a generous donation from our Crafty Ladies!!!

Finally, the Trustees will be preparing the Apple Alley rental house for sale in 2025.

## **Accessibility Update**



Mr. Daniel Card from Human Resources Foundation presenting a check for \$10,000.00 which was a Grant for a new ADA Compliant Ramp to the Education Wing of the building. In addition to the ramp, the entry door, Community Room, Conference Room doors were updated to be ADA compliant, along with a ADA update to one of the existing bathrooms. The interior work was funded by the Trustees ADA Fund.
